To Join Faculty



William S. Caldwell (above) will join the staff of the University School of Journalism as an assistant professor in September. Chancellor Robert B. House and Dean Norval Neil Luxon announced this week. A native of Alexandria, S. D., Mr. Caldwell holds two degrees from the University of Minnesota and has all work on his Ph.D. completed here except for final approval of his dissertation. His B.A. and M.A. are in journalism. His Ph.D. will be in political science.

Editor of the Minnesota Daily campus newspaper, as a student, Mr. Caldwell was graduated magna cum laude in 1943. After serving in the Army he was a foreign service officer with the State Department from 1946 through 1949. Most of his service was in Rome and Palermo, Italy, as press attache and public affairs officer.

In 1949-1950 Mr. Caldwell was public relations director and journalism instructor at the Duluth branch of the University of Minnesota and since 1950 he has taught journalism part-time while doing graduate work on the Minneapolis campus of the University of Minnesota. This last semester he also taught journalism at Macalester College in St. Paul.

Chancellor Describes Nature of Freedom

Chancellor Robert B. House of the University told junior college officials assembled here last week that freedom, which has an unbreakable tie with discipline in education, is more an achievement than a natural right.

"The freest man on earth is the one whose desires and actions coincide with what the law allows," he said, explaining that this man has developed his self-discipline to such a degree that his reactions to situations are automatically lawful.

The Chancellor spoke at the opening session of the seventh annual Junior College Work-Conference. W. Orson Beecher of Armstrong College, Savannah, Ga., who is conference chairman, presided.

A second speaker that day was Philip Welner, Oglethorpe University, conference consultant, who discussed "Freedom and Discipline in College Instruction." He was followed by Miss Ida Fitzgerald, assistant dean at Stratford College in Virginia, who talked on contributions of the humanities to freedom and discipline.

Chancellor House presided at the annual conference banquet Monday night, at which H. Arnold Perry, dean of the UNC School of Education, spoke briefly.

Other authorities who spoke at the conference were Miss Katherine Taylor, dean of the Woman's College in Greensboro; Clarence H. Schletter of Duke University, Dean R. M. Lee of Mars Hill College, and Louis O. Kattsoff of the University here.

Chancellor House cited two factors which are indispensable for freedom and discipline in education: "Love, which will counteract the desire for destruction and rule violation; and time, which parents must give their children along with loving care."

Governing of any student group, he said, can best be carried out by the students themselves, "who know the facts and are closer to the truth." He noted that a general "negative judgment" evident among young students today can ruin enforcement by faculty groups. "It is better to turn this influential element into a constructive force through self-government," the Chancellor

Chancellor House stressed that common sense should prevail in a situation of academic discipline and freedom, and commented that every academic circle is surrounded by the "body politic"—the outside world which always wants to have a hand in shaping the institution's policies and procedures.

The overall theme for the conference, "Education for Freedom," was the basis for each of the addresses given during the three days.
