Y-Teens and Recreation Center Benefit Young People

Two Community Chest agencies which are of direct benefit to the young people of Chapel Hill are the Y-Teens for girls and the Recreation Center, membership in which is open to boys and girls from the sixth grade through high school.

With headquarters in the old Methodist Church on East Franklin, the Recreation Center, known to its members as the "Rec," is open five days a week from 3 to 5:30 p.m. and on Saturdays from 2 to 5 p.m. Usually Fridays are set aside for the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades and Saturdays for the high schoolers.

Dances are held after football and basketball games for the high school group from 10 p.m. to midnight. Indoor games of all kinds and shuffleboard out-of-doors keep "Rec" members occupied. Members pay a \$1 yer year fee. Last year there were 180 members and Miss Sarah Umstead, director, expects the membership to pass the 200 mark this year. Miss Carla Smith is Miss Umstead's assistant. From 35 to 40 make use of the Center on a typical afternoon. At the night sessions, particularly on dance nights, the attendance often exceeds 150.

Community Chest officials have allocated \$4,923, same amount as in 1955, to the Recreation Center for 1956. The Y-Teens are divided
