Students Are Made to Pay For Parking

The continuing crackdown on persons who collect violation tickets and forget to pay their \$1 fines landed five University students in Recorder's Court Monday. All five settled their tickets and had to pay court costs on top of that.

One student was in the three-ticket category, which is the least number a person may collect before he is liable for a warrant. Two of the other students had collected six tickets each, and the remaining two had seven tickets each.

It was learned last week that the University administration was considering drafting a letter to parents of students who have collected five or more unpaid parking tickets. To that end, Mrs. Barbara Howdy, town traffic clerk, has prepared a list of such students for the University.

The proposed letter may recommend to the parents that they prohibit their children from keeping automo-

Auto Supply Store Manager to Resign


Henry D. Fowler, manager of Brown's Auto Supply, said yesterday he thought arrangements for the sale of the business would be complete by the end of this week.
