

Sandy McClamroch, president of radio station WCHL, where Mr. Rogers conducts an early morning and a midday radio program, stated to the Weekly on Tuesday that until Monday, when the fact came out that John Rogers' name had actually not been officially taken off the ballots, though he had announced his intention to drop out of the Town Constable race, WCHL had assumed that Mr. Rogers had formally notified the elections board of his withdrawal from the election.




