She was taken there on Wednesday of last week and is the first polio case to be reported in Orange County this year. Hospital authorities said yesterday that she does not show any definite evidence of paralysis.

Religious Education Director Named For the Chapel Hill Baptist Church

The Rev. Samuel Tilden Habel yesterday announced the appointment and the arrival of a new full-time director of religious education for the Chapel Hill Baptist Church. She is Miss Betty Hodges of McAdams, Miss. Miss Hodges will begin her duties tomorrow (Saturday). Her principal work will be with the young people of the church, with emphasis upon those of high school age. In addition to her special work with young people, she will assist with the entire educational program of the church and with visitation.

The new educational director is 26 years of age, holds a Bachelor of Science degree from William Carey College and her Master's degree in Religious Education from the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. She has had considerable experience in denominational work with young people, having served two summers as field worker for the Mississippi Training Union Department and two summers as staff-member of Camp Garaywa, Clinton, Miss., a camp operated for young people by the Woman's Missionary Union of Mississippi. This past summer Miss Hodges served as assistant camp director.

Trophies will be awarded flight winners, and rotating trophies will be awarded low gross and low net winners.
