

### Miss Eunice Sayre Gets Library Post

Miss Eunice Sayre, a native of Huntington, W. Va., has been named to succeed Oliver Orr as assistant head of the circulation department of the University's Wilson Library.

Mr. Orr, an employee of the library since 1949, has resigned to pursue graduate work on a doctor of philosophy degree in American history.

Miss Sayre received a master's degree in Library Science from Columbia and is now completing work for a M.A. in Romance languages at UNC. She has had varied library experience at the Huntington Public Library, the libraries of the Universities of Texas and Virginia, she also served as Librarian at Sullins College for three years. She has also taught French and served as Librarian at St. Katharine's School in Davenport, Iowa; Onaway High School, Onaway, Michigan; and Wayland Academy, Beaver Dam, Wisconsin.

### Adult Theatre Prices Upped

Chapel Hill theatre ticket prices for adults will be increased by five cents during the week-end, upping the admission price to 55 cents at all hours and on all but special-price movies.

Admission prices for children will remain at 15c and for high school students at 30c.

E. Carrington Smith and Ardy Gutierrez, managers of the Carolina and Varsity theatres, explained that the increase in admission prices was necessary because of higher operating costs and in order that local theatres might be able to play pictures as soon as possible after release dates.

Since a majority of motion pictures these days are booked on percentage, distributors are inclined to permit movie theatres charging high admission prices to play them first. The local managers pointed out that Durham, Greensboro, Charlotte and many other communities charge 65c and 75c for regular admission.

Last week the Federal government eliminated the 10 per cent tax on admission prices under 90 cents, but no lowering of admission prices was anticipated because of higher operating costs.

That, it was explained, was because the tax was removed primarily to help theatre operators in small towns and neighborhoods who have experienced falling incomes since the coming of television.

### Facsimile Newspaper Baby of Daniel

"Are you going to talk about facsimile newspaper production?" Clifton Daniel was asked in a Chapel Hill-to-New York telephone call this week.

Mr. Daniel is to speak to North Carolina news and feature writers at a conference here Saturday.

"I haven't been asked to talk about that," he said. "My subject is handling the news on the Times, and it will probably cover news coverage as well as writing."

"I don't see how I can get around to more than a couple of subjects," he said, "for I have been allotted just twenty minutes. And it usually takes me twenty minutes to get started."

However, there will be a question period following his formal speech, and Mr. Daniel will answer questions on facsimile or anything else during that time. "That includes answering questions about the state of my health," he said.

Mr. Daniel, an alumnus of the University, had charge of the New York Times' latest development in what may eventually be an effective national newspaper. Complete pages of the Times were photographed and transmitted electronically from New York to San Francisco during the Republican Convention, with an eight-page New York Times provided at breakfast time for 20,000 convention attendants in San Francisco.
