

Board Makes Recommendations To Stores For Abandonment Of Half-Day Holiday

The board of directors of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Merchants Association voted Monday to recommend to the member merchants that they remain open for business on Wednesday afternoons all year round.

Customarily, many merchants have been closing on Wednesday afternoons during the summer months.

The recommendation was made primarily because of the decision of Durham merchants to remain open all day on Wednesdays. In the past, most Durham stores also had closed on Wednesday afternoons during

the summer. The directors voted on the recommendation after a poll of the merchants showed 31 firms in favor of staying open and 26 against. The vote among the directors was four in favor of staying open one against, and three abstentions.

At its meeting Monday, the board accepted the resignation of William Hobbs of Glen Lennox as a director. Mr. Hobbs said his resignation was mandatory because business conflicts prevented his attending the board meetings and he felt the Merchants Association would be better represented by someone more directly concerned with retail merchandising in the downtown district.

Joe Augustine, manager of Stevens-Shepherd clothing store was elected by the board to complete Mr. Hobbs' term, which expires next fall.

In other action, the directors approved a resolution calling on the Board of Aldermen to see what can be done about improving lighting on Franklin Street.

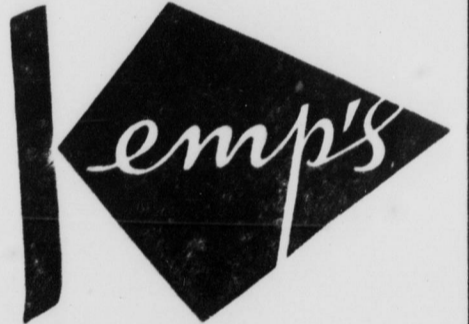
