Baptist Meetings

The Yates Baptist Association has two meetings scheduled for this week, one in Chatham County at the Olive Chapel Baptist Church on Tuesday night, July 18, and one at University Baptist Church, Chapel Hill, on Friday night, July 21.

Tuesday night is the time for the quarterly Sunday School meeting with conferences scheduled for the leaders in the churches of the various Sunday School age-groups. Several state convention workers will be coming from Raleigh to assist, including the Rev. Richard Smith for pastors and superintendents, the Rev.
