

# Wildcats Beat Graham 21-12

Chapel Hill's Wildcats defeated a winless, but fired up Graham team 21-12 Friday night behind the passing of Don Smith and the half drumming of halfback Charlie Riggsbee.

Smith completed 7 of 8 passes for 141 yards and connected on two long aerials which led to Chapel Hill touchdowns in the first and second quarters. Smith also scored the Wildcats' first touchdown on a three yard run.

That first touchdown came after a series of exciting plays highlighted by a 45-yard pass from Smith to Tony Lloyd. A few downs later Smith took the ball over from the 2 yard line on a sneak up the middle and Riggsbee scored the extra point on a run. Nine plays were needed to

travel the 65 yards to the goal line.

Graham, however, came right back to score on the second play of the second period on a 23 yard run by John Clark. Clark rolled out to the left on an option play, decided to keep the ball, and ran through and around most of the Wildcat secondary for the touchdown. The placement attempt by Tom Satterfield was wide.

Later in the same period Smith dropped back near his own goal line and cut loose with a long pass to Riggsbee. Riggsbee fought his way to the Graham 36 carrying a couple of tacklers part of the way.

But again the fired up Graham team reached pay dirt. They came down field 47 yards in 9 plays and scored on a 1-yard plunge by Mike Kernodle.

The touchdown came in the fourth quarter and ended the scoring at 21-12 in favor of Chapel Hill.

Smith's passing was the difference in the game. The Graham defense held the Chapel Hill backs, except Riggsbee, in check and forced Smith to the air for the big plays of the game.

The Wildcat defense was again led by linebacker Sonny McIver who made countless stops. The hard charging of the defensive line and the pass protection of the offensive line were also commendable. On several occasions sparking play by the defense came frustratingly close to giving

the Wildcats an added point bulge.

Another step on a pass-interception and another two inches higher on a leap to intercept a pass could have meant six points to Tom Broadfoot and Lloyd respectively.

This conference win moves the Wildcats a notch ahead of Oxford into fifth place in the conference. Chapel Hill has a conference record of 1-1-1 and an overall record of 2-1-1.

Next week Chapel Hill takes on Hillsboro in the annual battle for the County championship. It will be this year's homecoming game for the Wildcats.

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## Sports Report

The first thing that comes to mind when the names Jim Hickey and Earle Edwards are mentioned is the word "gentlemen." Both the Carolina and the N. C. State football coaches are noted for their even good humor and their genuine friendliness towards their colleagues and all their other acquaintances.

Yet, when the two met in the center of the field of Kenan Stadium Saturday immediately following Carolina's thrilling 27-22 victory over the Wolfpack, their encounter, if not actually cool, was at best perfunctory.

Under any other circumstances a meeting between these two men would have been one of mutual cordiality and warmth. But both Jim Hickey and Earle Edwards are openly honest, both with themselves and with others. And to anybody familiar with the compelling amenities and vicissitudes connected with coaching intercollegiate football, the brief handshake and the almost inaudible amenities exchanged between the two men, would seem the natural course of events.

For Earle Edwards, the defeat, his second straight for the year, was a bitter disappointment, and his face plainly showed it. For Jim Hickey, the win, his third straight (including wins over Virginia and Duke last year), was extremely gratifying, though his elation must have been tempered by the fact that had the game lasted a few moments longer, Roman Gabriel, who had finally found the range, might well have passed State to a tremendous comeback victory, after trailing the Tar Heels 10-27.

In the past, I have known coaches, both at Carolina and elsewhere, who faced their victorious opposite numbers with post-game smiles and profuse congratulations, only to retreat to the safety of their dressing rooms to sulk or to harangue their bedraggled players for their real and imagined mistakes on the playing field.

Neither Jim Hickey nor Earle Edwards will ever do this. And this is another reason why both of them are a real credit to their profession and to college football.

**You Hear 'Em Pop**

As a sideline photographer for Carolina's home games for the past several years, I have become fascinated, indeed, at times mesmerized, by the ferocity of impact of player against player when two big, anxious lines tear into one another. You can hear 'em pop clean across the field. And when they're lined up over the inbounds marker on your side of the field, the impact is awesome to see and hear.

There is, of course, no doubt that the sideline observer misses many of the niceties of the game which are immediately apparent to the trained observer in the pressbox or from any seat high in the stands. Such maneuvers as reverses and other plays in

which the ball is passed from player to player, being especially hard to follow. Also, when the play is all the way across the field, it often appears to the sideline as though the men are running on their knees, because of the curvature of the field for drainage purposes.

**The Real Thing**

But down on the sidelines is where you see and hear the real thing, the sweat and guts and the immense joy of being young and very strong. Down there you can hear and see at close range where the games are won and lost, depending on which line hits the "firstst" and the hardest. And occasionally you are treated to some choice dialogue.

Last Saturday it was Carolina's line that hit the hardest.

And when you get used to this ground-level viewing, watching the game from high atop the stands or in the pressbox seems mild by comparison. It's sort of like kissing your best girl through a veil—nice, but it could be much more exciting.

## County Boards Meeting Today

The Orange County School Board, the County Commissioners, and the Orange County ABC Board were scheduled to hold regular monthly meetings in Hillsboro today.

The County School Board will come to a decision on how to handle the current suit over the excavation of rock at the Hillsboro High School three years ago; will study architect's preliminary drawings of the consolidated Orange County High School; and will decide whether to instruct surveyor Robert Jones to survey for water and sewage lines to the consolidated High School.

In new business, the School Board will hear the annual report of the County auditor; will distribute appropriation expenditure statements for the last three months; will appoint delegates to the November 8 meeting of the School Board Association in Chapel Hill; will determine the length of the work day for garage workers and maintenance men in the County school bus garage; will declare a surplus of school furniture and offer it for sale; will consider Lizzie Morrow's plan to lease or purchase the White Cross School property for use as a residence; and will hear a request from Howard Smith that bookshelves and drapes in the White Cross School be given to the White Cross community building.

The County Commissioners will hear routine reports.

The County ABC Board will hear monthly reports of store managers and enforcement officers.
