Orange's Leaf Loss May Hit \$1 Million

County Agricultural Agent Ed Barnes told the County Commissioners yesterday that Orange County's tobacco farmers may lose nearly \$1 million in tobacco crop income this year.

The reason for the income drop is the severe drought which hit parts of the County, particularly in the north end, this summer.

Mr. Barnes said a poll of tobacco farmers indicated an anticipated tobacco income two-thirds to three-fourths the size of last year's.

The basic curriculum in the Chapel Hill school system is unchanged from last year. However, some changes have been made in the Chapel Hill Senior High and Lincoln High curriculum. Briefly, these changes have resulted in enrichment of the curriculum for college-bound students, and a more applicable curriculum for non-college-bound students.

According to Dr. Thompson, the rearrangement of existing faculty members' duties, and the acquisition of additional State-paid faculty members "has resulted in the creation of new courses facilitating a more comprehensive curriculum and greater development of the multi-track approach to high school education."
