Red Cross Offers Baby Care Course

Questions and problems of prospective parents will be thoroughly discussed in a free course in Mother and Baby Care to be offered next month by the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Chapter of the American Red Cross. The class sessions will be held from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. October 14, 16, 17, 21, 23, and

24, in the Red Cross headquarters at 211 W. Main St. in Carrboro.

The course is designed to acquaint the prospective parents and any other concerned persons with the details of what to do before and after the baby arrives, and during the baby's first year. Mrs. James Milligan, a special-

ly trained registered nurse and instructor for the course, will explain and discuss the baby's progress from conception through birth, the need for periodic medical examinations for both mother and baby, the questions of budgeting time and money, the responsibilities of parents to the community, and how community health affects family health.

All expectant parents, fathers included, and anyone else interested in learning care of the mother and new baby are urged to register now. The class must be limited to 15 members. Registration may be made in person at the Red Cross headquarters by telephoning 942-4862, or by postal card to Red Cross, 211 W. Main St., Carrboro.

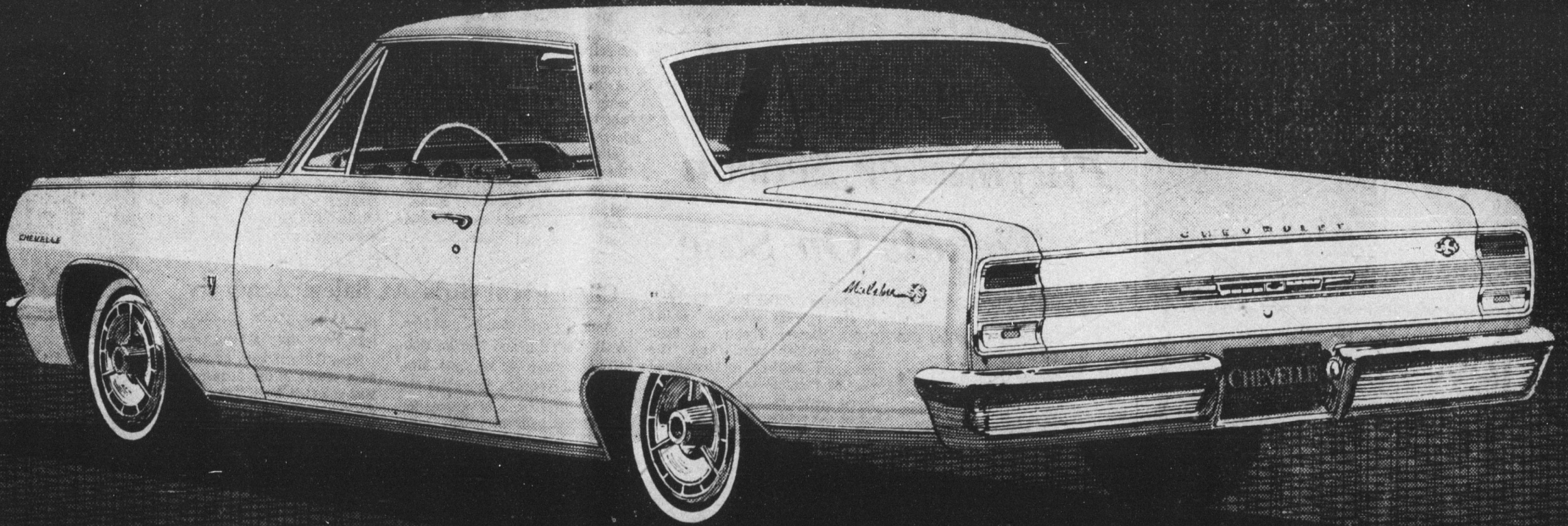
