Fluoridation Due About 1st Of Year

Fluoridation of the Town's water supply should take place sometime around the first of next year, provided no new legal barriers are raised.

University Business Manager J. Arthur Branch said today that the fluoridation equipment supplier had set a delivery date for 14 weeks after the University's order for the equipment was re-activated. The supplier, DIF Industries, was originally low bidder for the fluoridation system and the University had placed an order with the firm June 7, 1960.

Mr. Branch said he expected the equipment to be in operation within two weeks of its mid-December delivery date, provided no further litigation designed to block fluoridation were encountered.

A three-year suit blocking earlier fluoridation was dismissed in late August in Chatham Superior Court. However, attorney Harold Edwards, representing plaintiff Manning Simons, said he planned to file a new suit in the near future. Mr. Edwards said today that the new suit's preparation was nearly complete, and that it would be filed shortly.

Logan And Davis Attend Conference

W. James Logan, executive director, and Robert L. Davis, program director, represented the North Carolina Heart Association at the Second National Conference on Rheumatic Fever Secondary Prevention Programs, held at Colorado Springs, Colorado, last week.

The conference was sponsored by the Council on Rheumatic Fever and Congenital Heart Disease and the Council on Community Service of the American Heart Association and the Heart Disease Control Program, Division of Health Services of the United States Public Health Service.

The North Carolina Heart Association recently inaugurated a statewide rheumatic fever prevention program. The Orange County Heart Association, local division of the state heart group, announced a few days that its county program, headed by Dr. William Joyner, will get under way shortly.

She is survived by her husband, Siegfried Merzbacher; one son, Dr. Eugen Merzbacher, professor of physics at the University; one daughter, Mrs. Dorothea Brander, of Edinburgh, Scotland; and seven grandchildren.

Burial services will be held at graveside in the Chapel Hill Memorial Cemetery.

Bobby Ray Dies In Charlottesville

Bobby Bowden Ray, 35, of Charlottesville, Va., and formerly of Carrboro, died yesterday morning in Martha Jefferson Hospital in Charlottesville.

He had been in declining health for the past two years. He served in the Korean War and received his B.A. degree from the University here. He was assistant auditor of the State Farm Mutual Insurance Co.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Dana Phipps Ray; one son, Bobby B. Ray II of the home; his mother, Mrs. Mallie Bowden Ray of Carrboro; one sister, Mrs. R. J. Shields at Atlanta; and one brother, G. H. Ray of Montgomery, Ala.

Young Republicans Hear Rep. Lacey

In a talk to UNC Young Republicans, State Rep. Philip L. Lacey said last night he does not "see anything wrong in lowering the voting age to 18."

Rep. Lacey urged the Young Republicans to get active in precinct politics. "The State of North Carolina is going to be one of the biggest battlegrounds in the election for President of the United States," he said.

Rep. Lacey cited 1962 Republican victories in Guilford County, where he lives, as coming from active organizing and the willingness of people to offer themselves as candidates.

About 50 girls at Woman's Col-

lege in Greensboro even gave up dates to participate in political organizing, he said. "Whenever the dean let them off the campus, they came to work for the Republican party."

"Too many of our community and business leaders who are aching in their hearts for the Republican party to take over the national and state governments are not willing to get out and work on the precinct level," Rep. Lacey added.

Rep. Lacey spoke to the UNC Young Republican Club, recently re-organized for the new school year. About 45 persons heard the speech.
