Rec Program Funds Are Appropriated

The Executive Committee of are now running on a tight budthe Chapel Hill Community Council voted unanimously Thursday night to appropriate between \$2941 and \$3420 to the Recreation

The Committee recently hesitated to give the Recreation Commission this formerly promised final payment from its 1963 Chest collections.

The recent success of the Recreation tax referendum had led the Executive Committee to believe the Recreation Commission would no longer need its final Chest payment. Robert Midgette, Community Chest Council chairman, said the committee had planned to distribute the promised donation among other agencies instead of giving it to the Commission.

But Town Manager Robert Peck, speaking for the Recreation Commission, said the Commission had included the promised allocation in its 1963-64 budget.

"If the money is not appropriated to the Recreation Commission it will mean cutting into the budget," said Mr. Peck, "and we
