

### Bishop To Install William Davidson

The Rt. Rev. Richard H. Baker of the Diocese of North Carolina, will hold the installation service for the Rev. William Davidson at the Church of the Holy Family at 8 p.m. Wednesday.

Mr. Davidson will be rector of the Church for the coming year after having exchanged parishes with the Rev. Loren B. Mead. Mr. Mead is now rector of Mr. Davidson's Christ Church in Esher, Surry, England.

Also at the installation service, Mr. Davidson will present to Bishop Baker candidates for confirmation. Bishop Baker will administer the rite of confirmation or laying on of hands.

The Rev. Thomas Thrasher, rector of the Chapel of the Cross, will preach the sermon. Following the service, a reception will be held in the parish house. Mrs. Charles P. Wales will be hostess.

### Moscow Chamber Orchestra Wins Standing Ovation

Music has been called the international language. It is fortunate indeed that this language is not specific as to come under the recent and much-discussed Speaker Ban, because if it were, the music lovers of Chapel Hill and its environs would have missed a rare artistic experience. For on Friday night, November 1st, the Moscow Chamber Orchestra gave a never-to-be-forgotten performance in the University's Memorial Hall.

This small group of young, dedicated musicians is making its first tour of this country, and we can only hope that this tour is not to be their last. Visually, the evening was a delight, with effective grouping of performers around a beautiful, white-clad lady cellist; aurally, the evening was even more so. Under the brilliant direction of Rudolph Barshai, each work on the varied program—Mozart's Symphony No. 29 in A major, K 201; Bartok's Divertimento for Strings (1939); Prokofiev's Fugitive Visions, Opus 22; and Vivaldi's Concerto in B Minor for Four Violins—received a warm, sensitive, and exquisitely precise reading. With each section of the orchestra sounding like a single player, extraordinary control was displayed throughout the program, especially, perhaps, in the suave elegance of the Mozart and in the barely audible pianissimo sections in the slow movement of the Bartok.

Four encores were demanded. For the last of these, Mr. Barshai, accompanied by his orchestra, played a haunting selection on the viola, to which the large and enthusiastic audience responded with a standing ovation.—MGC

## Right-Of-Way Being Given For Access Road To School

The County Commissioners Monday heard Mrs. Rebecca Clark report that she has almost all property owners involved signed to give right-of-way for a road from Merritt Mill Road to Lincoln High School.

The road, which the Commissioners have been considering for about three months, would provide access to Lincoln and Frank P. Graham schools for children walking to school from the Knolls and West Franklin Street areas.

But Commissioner Gordon Cleveland reported no progress in attempts to persuade William Tolliver to sell a tract of land adjacent to Lincoln High's land. The State Highway Commission is prepared to put in a paved road to the school, Dr. Cleveland said, if right-of-way can be provided. Purchase of the Tolliver tract would be necessary, in contrast to donation of right-of-way across other tracts, because the State must have a 50-foot right-of-way for the road and the Tolliver lot is only slightly more than 50 feet wide.

Dr. Cleveland said Mr. Tolliver had replied to inquiry about selling his land that he would confer with his wife. But he has not named a price for the land

yet. The Commissioners asked Mrs. Clark to get as many as possible of the remaining property owners to donate right-of-way for the road, and agreed that the Chapel Hill School Board is the proper body to buy the Tolliver tract, or instigate condemnation proceedings to obtain it.

Another road matter, the speed limit on the Airport Road leading northward from Chapel Hill, was reported to the board as partially solved. A 35 mph zone has been extended to the new town limits and an advisory rather than mandatory speed zone of 35 mph will be extended to Estes Drive.
