Superior Court today. John Manning and Robert Page, attorneys for Mr. Carlisle, appeared before the Aldermen and suggested an out-of-court settlement with the Town amending its ordinances to permit Mr. Carlisle's project. The Aldermen declined.

The Aldermen approved special duty pay of \$100 per man for Chapel Hill policemen who put in more than 1,000 hours of overtime during last summer's racial demonstrations here. The extra pay will be given to men who were on the Chapel Hill police force between May 25 and August 25 if they are still members of the police force.

Newman To Give **Recital Sunday** 

William S. Newman, Distinguished Alumni Professor of Music at the University, will give a public piano recital Sunday at 8 p.m. in the auditorium of Hill Music Hall.

The recital is free to the public.

Dr. Newman's program will include Brahms' set of Variations on a Theme by Robert Schumann, Op. 9. written in 1854; the only piano sonata left by the Swiss American composer Ernest Bloch, composed in 1935; J. S. Bach's keyboard Partita. No. 2 in C Minor; "Malaga" from the fourth Iberia Suite by the Spanish composer Isaac Albeniz, based on the popular Andalusian melody known as Malaguena; "The Alcotts" movement from Sonata 2, "Concord, Mass., 1840-1860," by Charles Ives; and Rhapsody in G Minor, Op. 11, No. 1, by the Hungarian composer Ernst Dohnanyi.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Dr. Newman has given one or two piano recitals at UNC almost every year since he joined the faculty in 1945. He has given or will be giving the same program this year in other North Carolina cities as well as cities in Virginia, Maryland, Massachusetts, Utah, and Montana.
