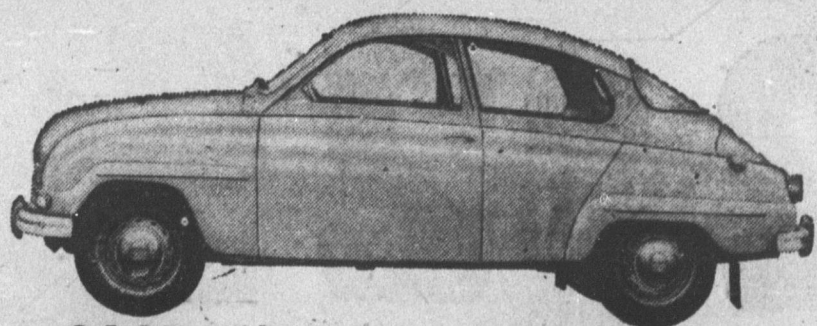

Baskin Exhibit At Haslem Gallery

Leonard Baskin, one of the significant figures of our time, will be exhibiting graphics at the Jane Haslem Gallery now through Dec. 14. Currently Mr. Baskin is living in North Hampton, Mass., and is professor in printmaking and sculpture at Smith College. He received his formal education at New York University, Yale University, New School for Social Research, N. Y., Academie de la Grande Chaumiere, Paris and Academia di Belle Arti, Florence.

His most recent exhibitions include a one-man exhibition organized by the Museum of Modern Art to circulate in Europe (1961-62), the Pittsburgh International Exhibition (1959-61), Recent Sculpture U.S.A., Museum of Modern Art (1959-60), and the VI Biennial, Sao Paulo, Brazil (1961). He has received the Louis Comfort Tiffany Grant, a Guggenheim Fellowship, the National Institute for Arts and Letters Grant and the Prix de Rome.

Leonard Baskin's sensitivity and awareness have given him a rare insight into our century. Many find him intolerable, for he is compelled to be the world's conscience. He is obsessive about man. In reply to opinions that he is morbid he says "the world of art is full of paintings of landscapes, flowers, still-lives, ripening grapes, young buxom ladies, dressed and undressed, and one has this entire world to choose from. Why can't one single, obscure, isolated artist be morbid, gruesome and decadent—although I don't agree that I'm any of these things. I keep seeing the gaping hole, the bleeding wound. The rest of the body may be healthy but the wound that bleeds is what concerns me. And I think that some artists should be concerned with this. I seek enrichment for my work in the natural world, in the world of man, in art itself." Baskin's basic corner, the human island, becomes in his art the channel for expressing his notions, feelings, and beliefs about life. His figures are decadent and worn by the corrosive wear of intense living. At the same time they maintain a grandeur, a nobility, never attained by youthful, untouched figures. The harsh, rugged expressiveness of woodcut and etching are richly exploited to convey his ideas. He says, "I should characterize my prints and drawings as didactic and moralistic, and trust they have become so through the devices of what was once called 'significant form'."

He has mastered and used art forms and media. He is best known for sculpture and graphic art. He is considered one of America's most outstanding artists in these media. He has established new tendencies and techniques within the etching media as well as being one of the contemporary artists to assert the importance of this traditional media in modern art. Thirty to fifty of his etchings

will be on exhibit at the Gallery. They will be a widely representative selection rewarding the viewer with a portrait of Baskin's "world view."

speech, religion, and press, would not respond to the call to arms. What difference, may I ask, if we accomplish the same result by our own ignorance, misunderstanding and inaction? For me, I prefer to fight—win or lose I would hope that the lawyers of North Carolina will be worthy of the words of Pericles to the widows of those brave Athenians who had fallen in battle:

Thus choosing to die resisting, rather than to live submitting, they fled only from dishonor, but met danger face to face, and after one brief moment, while at the summit of their fortune, escaped, not from their fear, but from their glory.

Otherwise, the glory of North Carolina—its fervent passion for freedom and truth—will be exchanged for false security against our fears.

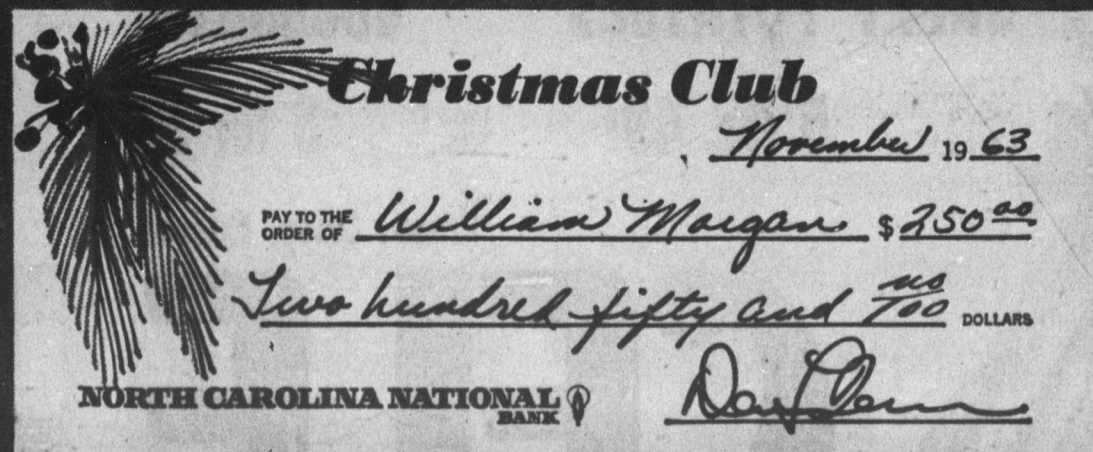
