1. Choose a tree with pliant and

pail of water outdoors in a spot

protected from the sun and wind

until you are ready to set it up

3. Saw several inches off the base of the trunk before bringing the tree indoors. Place the tree in the coolest spot in the

room, well away from a radiator

4. Keep the container in the

tree-stand filled with water dur-

ing the entire time the tree is

in the house. A surprising amount

of water will be absorbed and

5. Arrange the light bulbs on

the tree so that none will be in

direct contact with the needles.

6. If Christmas gifts are un wrapped near the tree, don't let

the wrappings accumulate under


