

Eastern Offers World Fair Trip

With the opening date for the World's Fair—April 22, 1964—only about four months away, Eastern Air Lines is actively promoting a wide selection of low-cost all-expense tours of New York City this coming spring and summer.

Such World's Fair vacations are being offered at rates as low as \$17 for three days and two nights in the heart of Manhattan, including an admission to the Fair, round-trip transfers between Fair and Hotel, and a choice of several sight-seeing trips in the city. For those who

wish a longer stay of seven days and six nights, with three days spent inside the Fair itself, there are tours starting at \$46.50. These prices are per person, but based on two sharing a room, and are plus air fare.

Eastern, which will be the only airline to have its own building within the Fair Grounds and to operate special "bus shuttles" directly to the Fair from the LaGuardia and Idlewild Airports, offers another exclusive feature: tickets to the Fair and round-trip transportation between these airports and the Fair for no more than just the regular admission—\$2 for adults, \$1 for children under age 13. (Children under two are transported and admitted free.)

For those who do not wish airport-to-Fair transportation, Eastern offices around the U. S., Canada, Mexico, Bermuda and Puerto Rico have been designated as special World's Fair representatives to sell admission tickets alone at \$1.35 for adults, 68 cents for children.

And as a special convenience for those coming in from Boston or Washington, these World's Fair tickets will also be sold on board Eastern's no-reservations, every-hour-on-the-hour "Air Shuttle" flights, with which the "bus shuttles" will connect.

Eastern is also offering a variety of side trips from metropolitan New York to Florida, Puerto Rico, New England, Canada, Bermuda, the national capital in Washington, and many other spots of scenic, historical or vacation interest.

A Christmas Pageant will be given at 5 p.m. in the Little Chapel, Chapel of the Cross, on Christmas Eve. An Open House will follow in the Parish House, at 5:30.

The Chapel Hill Junior Service League has reported results of its Christmas House project, held December 9 and 10 for needy families of the Chapel Hill area. A total of 150 families shopped at Christmas House with the coupons they received by mail.

Mrs. Jack Rogers, food chairman, reported that each family received its Christmas Day menu of a canned ham, vegetables, raisins, fruits, and a miscellaneous food item of their choice. Also, each family received two table decorations, one hanging decoration, and ornaments for a Christmas tree, all of which were made by Mrs. Charles Reap's committee.

Mrs. Carl Randolph, toy co-chairman reported that she bought 50 gun and holster sets, 50 footballs and basketballs, and 50 assorted sizes of toy trucks.

R. D. Smith and his Lincoln High School workshop groups repaired six rocking horses, four trucks, nine bicycles, 15

tricycles, three tractors and 12 small toy trucks. All of these toys were collected for Christmas House by the Jaycees during the paper drives this year. Mrs. J. W. Maultsby, toy chairman, purchased 175 dolls. A Carrboro woman's club dressed and contributed numerous dolls for the 500 children receiving toys from Christmas House.

Mrs. Samuel Hill reported she purchased 100 pairs of blue jeans, 100 flannel shirts, 94 dresses (sizes 2-12), 10 wool shirts, 10 wool skirts, 11 slacks sets, 69 pairs of slacks for boys 2-6 years old, and 500 pairs of socks. Each child received either a new dress or a new shirt and a pair of new socks. Junior Service League members made 18 sling-shot shifts. There was also used clothing which had been cleaned by local cleaners free of charge.

Thirty children in foster homes were included in the list of children who received gifts. All the left-over used toys were given to the Roberson Street Community Center.
