MOVIES

Carolina Theater-Today through Tuesday: "The Wonderful World of the Brothers Grimm." Laurence Harvey, Karl Boehm, Claire Bloom, Walter Slezak, Barbara Eden, Oscar Homolka. Three Grimm fairy tales, with a biographical portion about the fairy tales' authors, Wilhelm and Jacob Grimm, filmed largely on locations in Bavaria and the Rhine Valley. The three tales are "The Dancing Princess" (Yvette Mimieux, Russ Tarrblyn, Jim Backus), "The Cobbler and the Elves" (Laurence Harvey, Walter Brooke, the Puppetoons), and "The Singing Bone" (Terry-Thomas, Buddy Hackett, Otto Kruger). A good choice for a

non-syrupy Christmas movie.

# University Issues **Policy Statement**

The University has issued a policy statement on UNC students' participation in anti-segregation sit-ins.

According to UNC Dean of Student Affairs C. O. Cathey, "the names of all students who have been arrested for trespass and resisting arrest have been forwarded to the office of the student Attorney General who will, upon the final disposition of each case by the North Carolina courts, forward said case to the appropriate student judicial council for action."

Conviction by the University could result in penalties as stiff as expulsion. The statement was issued Friday afternoon following a meeting of the UNC Deans of Men Women, and Student Affairs, the president and vice president of the student body, and leaders of student judicial coun-

Dean of Men William Long said



that as of Thursday night 28 students had been arrested, some of them more than once, for a total of 34 student arrests. Dean Long said the disparity resulted from some students being arrested, going free on bond, and being arrested again in another sit-in.

The policy statement: "A singular function of the state university is its social responsibility to the total commun-This University has traditionally directed efforts for a more perfect realization of the democratic ideals. Such is the duty of the 'State' university as it has been conceived.

"It is apparent that the fabric of democracy is dependent upon its commitment to the necessity of law in the ordering of human activity. The educational institution cannot then condone the wilful disobedience of the laws, aside from the merits, demerits, or employment of particular
