Blair Publishes Manly Wellman Book

An award winning book by Manly Wade Wellman, "Settlement on Shocco: Adventures in Colonial Carolina," for young readers nine to thirteen, has been published by John F. Blair, publisher, of Winston-Salem.

"Settlement on Shocco" is fiction based on the facts of regional history and has won the literary award sponsored by the Carolina Chaoter Tercentenary Commission for prose fiction dealing with North Carolina history prior to the American Revolution

The story begins a little over two hundred years ago in what is now the southern part of Warren County, when a frontier family followed an Indian trail through the wilderness to Shocco Creek and there made a home for themselves.

By 1763 this family along with other settlers found it necessary to form counties. courts, county offices, and militia to protect themselves from exorbitant taxes, Lord Granville's unscrupulous rent collectors, dishonest land dealings, and Indian War. They were proud colonists who realized that their years of labor spent in building the frontier were endangered by King Ge-

orge's tyranny, and that they must soon assert themselves to be free from his oppression. Manly Wade Wellman was born in the Portuguese West African colony of Angola, the son of a medical missionary. He has published over forty books, many of

Registrars may also give prospective registrants a literacy test, although the litearcy test is oridinarily not required if an individual can satisfactorily fill out the registration card.
