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

THE FUSION SCHOOL TAX.

A Special Levy to be Voted for at the Next Election

The last Legislature passed an important act relative to the public schools, requiring the question of local taxation for public education to be voted upon at the next election for members of the Legislature, biennally thereafter by each township, city and town not already levying a special tax

for schools.

This special levy to be voted on is 20 cents on the \$100 of property, and 60 cents on each poll. The original bill, which applied to every county, was amended so that fifty-six counties were excepted, thus leaving the act in force in the countles of Alexander, Beaufort, Bladen, Burke, Cabarrus, Caldwell, Carteret, Cherokee, Clay, Dare, Davidson, Davie, Duplin, Gas-ton, Graham, Guilford, Harnett, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Macon, Madison, Mitchell, Montgomtrain at Walkertown to go to Dennis.
