Clyde Huey made a statement in his opening political address in Charlotte, that nobody could blame him for being a brother-in-law to Max Gardner, still it is a well known fact that in the days of the "closet" political nominations Shedly ruled the roost. But that day is passing and the people are thinking more for themselves than they are letting the "big-wigs" think for them.

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
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## Western Textile Council Meets In Concord Saturday
