BOND-OWNED TAX DODGERS CURBED

(Editor's Note .- On April 19, 1938, William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, delivered a radio address to Great Britain under the auspices of the British Broadcasting Association. Mr. Green spoke from the studios of the Columbia Broadcasting System, in Washington, D. C. The A. F. of L executive gave the British radio public a urvey of the present economic status of working men and women in the United States, explained the origin and sinister development of the attempt of John L. Lewis and his Committee for Industrial Organization to over throw democ-racy in the American Federation of Labor and establish a labor dictatorship under his personal control, stressed the cause and remedy for the tragedy of unemployment afflicting millions of workers, and urged the necessity of definite action by democracies to preserve popular governments throughout the world.)

The action of the Senate in stripping future issues of United States bonds of their exemption from Federal taxes by a provision in the five-billion dollar 1928 revenue bill is regarded as a step in the right direction by those who believe there should be no tax dodgers haven sanctioned by the Government itself. The bondtax amendment, submitted by Senator Borah, was adopted by the close vote of 34 to 33. The proposal is also favored by President Roosevelt.

It is frequently charged that those who talk the loudest in proclaiming the desirability of amending our Federal tax laws so as to to levy more taxes on the lower income groups in order wages to our members, while working to make them "tax conscious" are the very people whose safe deposit boxes are loaded with bonds exempt from Federal taxation.
