AVERAGE WAGE IN THE UNITED STATES BELOW \$900

Workers covered by the national old age insurance system, which extends to practically the entire industrial population, earned average wages of only \$890 in 1937, the first half of which was comparatively prosperous the Social Security Board revealed last month. Inclusion of wages not covered by the Social Security Act would probably bring the year's average for these workers to about \$975, according to a statement made by John J. Corson, Director of the Board's Bureau of Old-Age Insurance. During that year, wages totalling \$26,825,366 were credited to 30,157,694 individual accounts.

Broken down by region, the study revealed that the East North Central States had the highest average wage, \$1,020, followed by \$1,013 in the Middle Atlantic States, \$902 in New England, \$893 in the Pacific States, \$778 in the West North Central State, \$754 in the Mountain States, \$676 and \$671, respectively, in the West South Central and South Atlantic States and \$603 in the East South Central States. Workers in Michigan, with an average wage of \$1,102, had the highest average, those in New York ranked second with \$1,042, and those in Illinois third with \$1,029.



The machinists union has signed a closed shop agreement with the Wrights Machine Shop reducing their hours from 50 to 40 a week with the pay to remain the same. Among the colored tobacco workers employment is decreasing. The Durham Central Labor Union is sponsoring the annual Merchants and Manufacturers Parade of Progress. We will receive something like 20 per cent of the gross receipts which should give us from \$800 to \$1,000.—W. M. Barbee, in American Federationist for May.
