NEW YORK—Bernarr Macfadden was sued in Federal Court this week for an accounting of \$1,500,000 of the funds of the Macfadden Publications, the allegation that he spent the corporation's money in an attempt to obtain the Republican presidential nomination in 1936.

Macfadden, who is now running for the Democratic senatorial nomination in Florida, is accused of having switched \$250,000 of corporation funds to a wholly-owned subsidiary and then causing the debt to be cancelled.

Macfadden's tirades against Labor feature nearly every issue of his "Liberty."
