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A. F. L. To Have An Exhibit At Women's Expos.

NEW YORK CITY—The Women's International Exposition of Arts and Industries, featuring many phases of women's work in the war effort, to be held at Madison Square Garden November 19-24, will include an historical exhibit by the American Federation of Labor showing the role the AFL has played from the time of suffrage up to the attack on Wake Island where some 1,200 AFL workmen laid down their tools and took up guns. What has been done since that day in relation to the war effort will be revealed.

The exposition will feature the importance of women on the industrial front, including a job formation center.

Two Out Of Five Of "Tar Heel" Workers Women

Two out of every five workers in North Carolina's wartime industrial machine are women, according to results of a survey of five major industries made public today by the State Department of Labor.

A total of 81,812 men and 52,763 women are employed by 666 manufacturing establishments covered by the survey, the report shows. Of the 134,575 workers employed in these plants, 60.8 per cent are men and 39.2 per cent women.

Industries surveyed included 191 cotton textile establishments employing 41,500 men and 27,226 women; 44 furniture plants with 7,458 men and 253 women; 42 full-fashioned hosiery mills with 3,608 men and 6,897 women; 80 seamless hosiery mills with 3,303 men and 6,877 women; and 15 rayon manufacturing plants with 2,253 men and 2,041 women. A total of 294 mills listed as "other industries" were also surveyed, employing 23,690 men and 9,969 women.

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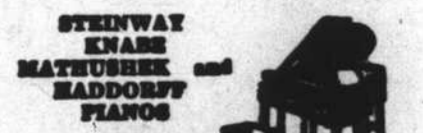
