[In compliance with duties imposed by the Social Security Act, Government officials have made various studies pertaining to provisions of the Act. These studies have developed the belief that certain changes should be made in the Social Security Act in order to meet the needs of American people. Because the editor of the Charlotte Labor Journal feels that residents of this section wish to know what changes are contemplated and because he thinks that his readers are entitled to such information, this paper in co-operation with the Charlotte office of the Social Security Board is presenting a series of articles explaining the proposed revisions. Given below is the sixth installment of this series.—Editor.]

The Social Security Board has recommended changes in the Social Security Act which include provisions for regular cash payments for:

Children whose parents are unem-ployed as well as those whose parents have died or who have deserted them or are incapacitated. Children who are in need whether

or not they are living with their pa-rents or with their own relatives or in oster homes.

Children who are between the ages of 16 and 18, if in need, whether or

not they are in school.

Monthly allowances for Aid to Dependent Children are paid to the mother or father or some other relative who is taking care of the child. Payments are made for the support of a dependent child until he reaches the age of 16, or 18 if he is still in school. The State decides who shall get this aid and how much will be paid to each children are in actual want because family concerned. The Federal Gov-they are not eligible for aid under ernment will pay half of whatever monthly allowance the State provides, up to \$18 a month for the first child and \$12 for each of the other children in the same family. The State may pay more than this amount, and it

may also pay less.

The Social Security Board believes that this amount of aid to dependent children is inadequate and recommends that the maximum limit on Federal contributions be increased or
