Mr. James P. Lawyer of Washington, D. C. is spending a few days in Charlotte, N. C. as Labor's representative of the War Fi-nance Division of the U. S. Treasury, and submits the following brunt of the cut back in employment. Savings must be guarded zealously, in order that inflation may be held to a minimum. Employment must gradually take place in the peace economy ta high wages in order to maintain

message to Labor.

The citizenry of North Carolina can be justly proud of their record in the purchase of War Loan Bonds. In the 7th Drive, War Bonds to the amount of 226% of the states over-all quota were purchased. This record was equalled only by her sister state, Tennessee, and was surpassed by none.

In bringing about this vast investment in War Bonds, labor played a very important part through payroll deductions, and by purchase for cash.

The day to which we have so long looked forward has arrived. The order to cease firing has been issued throughout the Pacific by both the enemy and allies. Today the chatter of small arms and machine guns has ceased, and the deep voiced heavy artillery is silent. Our mighty navy rests at anchor in numerous parts and the thousands of awe inspiring planes are grounded, and comparative silence pervades the island dotted Pacific.

While the task of winning the war has been brought to a victorious close, the equally important task of changing from a war to a peace economy still confronts us. The fighting forces must be brought home. The sick and wounded must have hospitalization, and employment must be furnished those who are able and willing to

work.

Industries formerly engaged in the production of war materials will revert to the production of pre-war commodities and new industries will be established as rapidly as possible. But at best, there will be a period of unemployment for several millions of employable individuals. It is believed that Congress will help meet this emergency by an act sufficient to maintain a fair standard of living.

Organized Labor must bear the

As in the prosecution of the war, Organized Labor will do its utmost to help establish a neace economy far above any that has ever existed on the face of the earth.


