been fortunate. We have fought and won two terrible wars within our time. Now our huge labor force is again peacefully producing for abundance. None of these victories over the forces of tyranny and want would have been possible without the patriotic support of the workers of America.

"Marked economic changes have taken place since your convention last year. Employment has reached record figures; unemployment has been held to a minimum. Substantial wage increases have benefited millions of workers. Production has reached new peacetime levels and work stoppages have declined. But prices have advanced to unreasonable heights and housing is far insufficient for the needs of many of our citizens. These are conditions which must be remedied so that we can maintain a stable and prosperous economy."

AFL'S TEXTILE WORKERS WIN FAVORABLE CONTRACT

Lawrence, Mass.—The AFL's United Textile Workers negotiated a new agreement with the Arlington Mills division of the William Whitman Co.

Under the contract, which runs until August 1, 1949, the union gained six paid holidays, improved paid vacations, time and a half pay for Saturdays and Sundays, hospitalization and surgical benefits, life, accident and sickness insurance, and other benefits.

The agreement provided for no immediate wage increase, but contains a clause providing for reopening of the wage question in February and August of each year.

The UTW recently defeated the CIO in an election to determine the bargaining agent for the company's 6,000 employees. The AFL group won by a large margin in its successful resistance to the CIO's raiding attempt.

The American Federation of Labor is concerned with the immediate welfare of its members, and the improvement of their security and their working and living conditions. It is likewise concerned with the interests of the nation as a whole, with the broadening of our social security system so that its benefits may be extended to a greater number and with the establishment of an adequate system of health insurance.

Turning to the problem of veterans housing, the Council urged adoption of the Wagner-Ellender-Taft bill to stimulate home building on a long-range basis. The report asserted:

"The American Federation of Labor is firmly committed to the principle that the availability of a decent home to every family is the responsibility of the whole community."

employing concern had refused to grant the carpenters' local a closed shop last February. The union then, it was said pulled carpenters off jobs on which employees of Watson's Specialty Store were employed.

At the same time the local union was alleged to have brought pressure upon contractors using material from the store in order to abrogate their agreement with Watson's.

The injunction would go beyond restraining the union from boycotting the specialty store and seek to enjoin any strike of union carpenters where the object was to force an employer or anyone else who did business with the store to refrain from doing so.
