Good Relations is the goal of the Union Industries Show. The fourth all-union AFL exhibition is scheduled for May 18th through the 22nd in the mammoth Public Auditorium at Cleveland, Ohio. Consumers—especially trade unionists—will get a big thrill when they see the coming, spectacular event.
