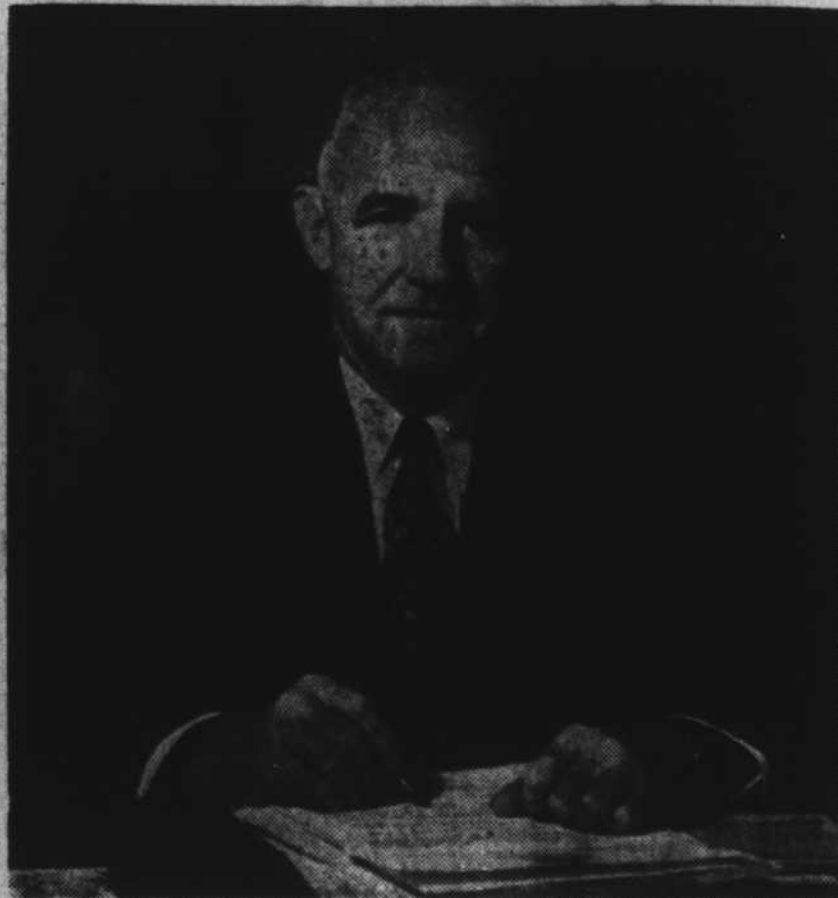

Wins In Primary Race



Senator Frank P. Graham was the top man in the North Carolina senatorial race in the Primary election on May 27 by over 50,000 votes. The next highest man was Willis Smith of Raleigh, who campaigned hard throughout the State against Mr. Graham, raising the racial and communism issues against the former president of the University of North Carolina.

Frank Graham's boyhood home of Charlotte now indicates that it will give him many more votes from Mecklenburg than he received in the primary as the result of the elimination of Robert R. Reynolds of Asheville.

Mr. Smith has the right to call for a runoff election within 12 days after the primary election but as The Labor Journal goes to press this week no word has been forthcoming from Mr. Smith's Raleigh headquarters as to his intentions.

A record vote was cast in the State in the May 27 primary, over half a million votes being cast.

The afternoon session will begin at 2:00 o'clock in the hotel ball room, presided over by President A. J. Garner, III, of Asheville. Likewise the business session of the Auxiliary will convene in the Rose Room at 2:00 o'clock and will be presided over by Mrs. A. J. Garner, III.
