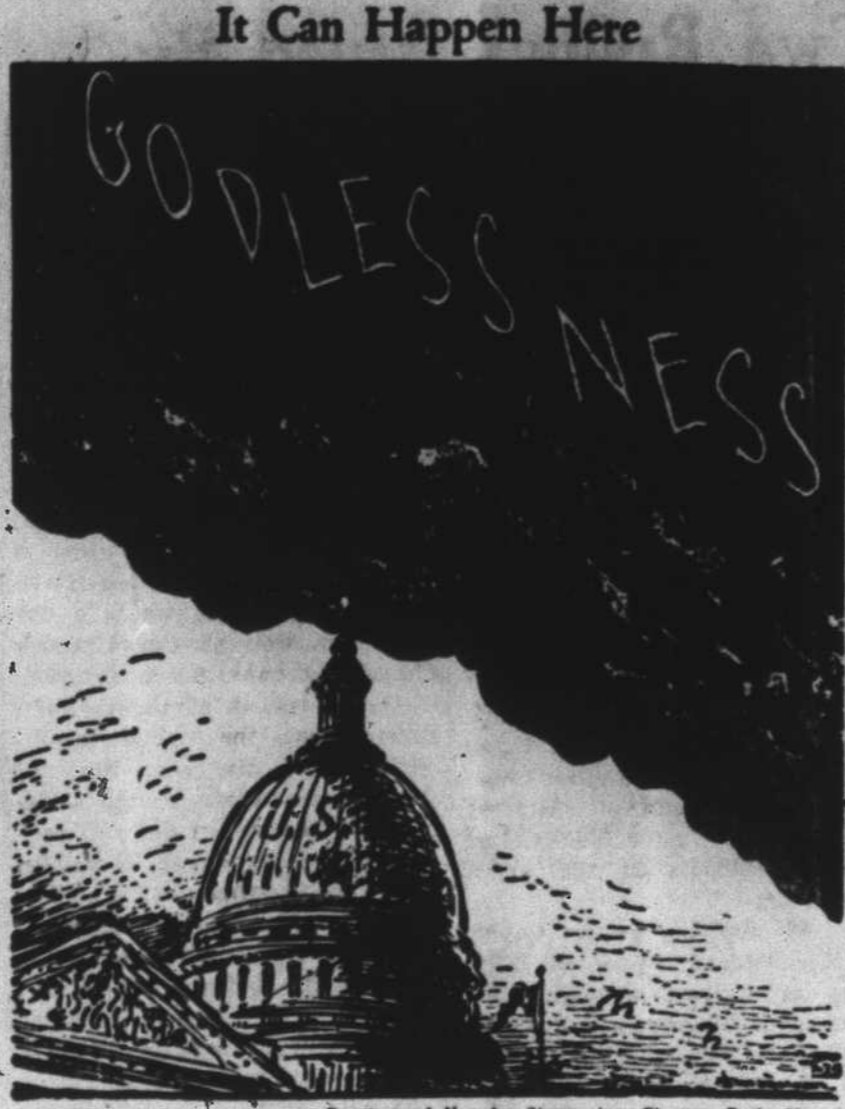
Kate Smith no fears
