Easy-to-Make Jelly

Jelly-making nowadays is a far cry from the same operation in Grandmother's day. The modern homemaker no longer uses guesswork and she can use many fruits that years ago were considered poor for "jellying."

Most of all, modern methods for jelly-making assure today's homemaker of perfect results, whether she be an inexperienced bride or a veteran cook. Grandmother would gasp with pleasure at today's accurate recipes with exact measurements which have taken the guesswork out of jelly-making. Even a working housewife whose time is limited can turn out jelly that is rich and clear by using the short-boil method with natural fruit pectin.

We suggest you try using powdered or bottled fruit pectin to make jellies and jams of fresh color and fine flavor. Moreover, you'll find that these tested recipes are economical - they produce half again more jelly than the old-fashioned laborious methods, within fifteen minutes after the fruit is prepared.

> Grape Jelly 5 cups juice

61/2 cups sugar 1 box powdered fruit

To prepare the juice. Stem about 3½ pounds fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. (Concord grapes give best color and flavor.) Add 1½ cups water; bring to boil and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 5 cups juice into a large saucepan.

To make the jelly. Measure loose-skinned grapes. Bring pulp sugar and set aside. Place sauce- to a boil and simmer, covered pan holding juice over high heat.

Add powdered fruit pectin and Chop or grind skins and add to stir until mixture comes to a pulp. Measure 5 cups into large hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring consix-ounce glasses.

Grape Jam 5 cups prepared fruit

½ bottled fruit pectin

Ladle quickly into glasses. ParTo Prepare Fruit. Slip skins affin at once. Makes about 12 from about 31/2 pounds fully ripe six-ounce glasses.

To Make the Jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix stantly. Remove from heat, skim, | well. Place over high heat, bring pour quickly into glasses. Par-affin at once. Makes about 11 hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit.
