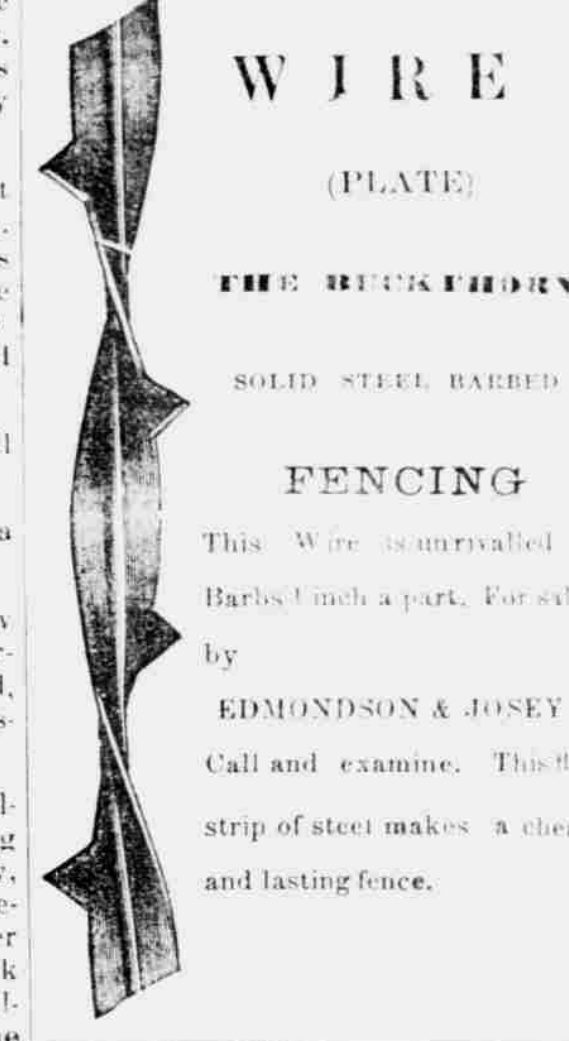
GENERAL.
