Three successive eclipses are a very rare occurrence, still it happens sometimes, On Decemb r 1, 1880, there was a partial eclipse of the sun, followed January 16 by a total eclipse of the moon, and on December 31 another partial eclipse of the sun occurred. Exactly the same happened in 1884 on March 27, April 10 and 26. If the predicted end of the world doesn't come inside of a year, and we live long enough, we will be able to see a total . He cut his corn behind the frost, eclipse of the moon on July 22, 1888; which is preceded and followed by partial cellipses of the sun. It will not happen in this century again.

The last twenty-five years' history of coal oil in the nine counties of Pennsylvania that constitute the oil region reads like a chapter from the story of Aladdin. Strange as it may oppear, the oil wells of this limited district have been worth more than the great Comstock lode of precious metal in Nevada. The record shows that 53,000 wells in all have been bored at a cost of \$200,000,000, and these have yielded 310,000,000 barrels of erude oil, worth at the wells \$300,000,-000. The drollest fact about the Pennsylvania oil business is that the oil is used for illuminating purposes in all parts of the world but the oil district itself-and here they use natural gas, because it is cheaper. The information on this point is due to investigations made by Dr. Andries, who, havingredentated that accidents from lightning have increased by from three to five fold during the last fifty years, finds that the causes which have commonly been assigned for the phenomena do not by tery means account for all. His theory i that the main cause is to be found in the commons increase of manufactories. Io comotives, etc., which fill the air with smoke, steam, and particles of dust of all kinds, while the increased population must be considered as also contributing where amount of impurity to the at mosphere, and consequently adding to its abnormal elements. It is asserted by Dr. Andries that his own extensive series of experiments, as well as those made by others, show conclusively that all the electrical phenomena of the air increase in intensity with the increase of dust iff it.
