Congressional Convention in Weldon.

HON. F. M. SIMMONS ENDORSED.

Weldon, N. C., May 24 '88.

Convention called to order by R. B. Peebles, Chairman of District Com., at 3:10. P. M. Mr. Jno. E. Woodward was requested to act as permanent chairman, Mr. W. W. Hall as Secretary.

Upon motion of Major Emery it was ordered that a Committee on Credentials be appointed by selecting one member from each county. All the counties in the district were represented in person or by proxy except Green.

COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS. Bertie—J. A. Harrell. Craven—J. B. Banks. Edgecombe—H. C. Bourne. Halifax—M. H. Clark. Jones—J. B. Banks. Lenoir—Clement Manly. Northampton—D. B. Zollicoffer. Vance—E. L. Emry. Warren—R. B. Peebles. Wilson—E. A. Woodward.

Upon motion the temporary organization was made permanent.

Upon motion of H. C. Bourne, a committee consisting of one member from each county was appointed to recommend elector for the district and two delegates and two alternates to the State Convention, and the following were appointed: J. A. Harrell, Clement Manly, H. C. Bourne, Jas. T. Gooch, J. B. Banks, T. W. Mason, T. L. Emry, R. B. Peebles, A. Green. The committee retired from the hall.

Upon motion a committee was appointed to wait on Congressman Simmons and request him to address the convention. Mr. Simmons came into the hall, was enthusiastically greeted, and spoke for about an hour, stating that the Democratic party was in a better condition than it had been for years; that with hard work we were certain of success; that the president had given to the country an issue, viz: Reduction of the Revenue; that the Democrats in Congress were more in harmony on the tariff question than they ever had been. He paid a glorious tribute to the indomitable will, energy, and thought of Mr. Carlisle, and eulogized Mr. Randall, but said that Mr. Randall was in a hopeless Democratic minority as regards free trade and protection. Mr. Simmons' speech was statesmanlike, he is a fine orator, and commanded the attention of the whole convention, and his speech was loudly applauded.
