THE CRISIS UPON US.

Before another issue of THE DEMOCRAT greets our readers we shall have passed the greatest crisis perhaps that the free voters of American civilization have ever faced. Which way shall be the turning? What shall be the result?

These are questions of infinitely more importance than the pen of any writer can portray. Since that eventful surrender of Cornwallis to Washington on the 19th day of October, 1781, there has not been a more decisive struggle with American freedom than will engage every free voter of this nation on Tuesday next. The smoke of the civil war has been driven away forever by the zephyrs of peace and the hurrying winds of a growing prosperity. The thunder of cannon has been drowned for many years by the din of business and the buzz of American industry. The tramping of horsemen to the field of internecine strife and the gleam of the sword have been hushed by the plowman's merry song and supplanted by the sharp sickle of many bountiful harvests. And for years we have enjoyed the blessings of Democratic supremacy, to the joy of a nation without a peer on the foot-pressed soil of the handwork of God. Freedom of thought and freedom of speech and freedom of action are the characteristic privileges of an American citizen. The blessings of Democracy vouchsafe to every man, woman and child, the protection, as members of society, that the principles of the laws and the government of this great free nation ordained they should enjoy.

And now, regardless of the threatening attitude of the Republican party, what reason is there for allowing a change in the present administration? There is absolutely none. For a quarter of a century after our own bloody war the Republican party held the reins of power, and we know too well with what results to our grinding oppression and unjust taxation. The Democratic party, now struggling for the maintenance of its own power, says to every man in this broad land, both white and black, "You are unjustly oppressed by a burdensome tax upon four thousand articles which you daily consume, and we are striving to relieve you from this burden." Shall we not give them the chance to do it? Will not every true lover of his country and of his race say by his ballot on 8th of this month that Democracy is the salvation of our liberties and that his ballot shall help swell the number of those who are honestly fighting for it?

And then when the voters of good old North Carolina remember that the second man on the Republican ticket has today, before the Supreme Court of the United States, an unjust claim of thirty millions of dollars against the voters of this State—we say when we remember this, how can we fail to see, how can any man, white or black, fail to see that it is for our highest interests and our only safety to do all in our power to suppress this gigantic, fast-growing, and unrelenting monster, striving to make inroads upon the rights and liberties of the thousands of honest, toiling citizens of the commonwealth of our own State?

In the name and for the sake of the maintenance of the grandest government known to man; in the name of sixty millions of people anxiously awaiting the result of this momentous contest; in the name of personal liberty and the fire-side happiness of every single home in its broad, broad land; in the name of right and justice—in the name of our own homes and our own continued happiness, we call upon every white man and upon every honest, patriotic citizen, of whatever blood or race of this nation today, to cast his ballot on Tuesday next for a continuation of Democratic supremacy and for the continued prosperity and peace of a great free people.

Jim Goodwin, J. H. Hannon, Columbus Baker and others spoke here Wednesday of last week. They had a small crowd, but if it had not been a wet day they would have had a still smaller one. The cotton-pickers could not work in the field, so they came to town in the forenoon and remained all day.
We have reported as many Republican harangues as we can now allow space for. We heard part of Goodwin's speech and also a part of Hannon's; the others we did not hear. We do not remember anything that Hannon said, and about all that Goodwin said struck us as being true was his statement to the colored people that if they get anything they must work for it. He closed by saying that white people could vote as they please; and then he said to the "niggers," as he called them—"We'll vote together."
We did not hear the first of Goodwin's speech, but a gentleman of refined taste told us that it was shockingly vulgar. He played monkey-pretty well while we heard him, and the colored people said they were ashamed of him.

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As the Weldon Fair is still in progress, we can not give much account of the week's happenings in this issue. We will try to give a fuller account next week.

Numbers of colored people here say they will not vote for Lewis, Baker or Goodwin. Some of them say they are ashamed of Goodwin as their county leader, and no wonder!
Jim Goodwin and his crowd of able companions spoke at Mullin's Thursday; and a gentleman from near there told us Monday that the colored people there say they are not going to vote for Goodwin or Columbus Baker.

HOW THE NEGRO WILL VOTE.

An Arkansas exchange clips the following from the Norfolk Lead, which is worth repeating:
Since the elective franchise was conferred on the Negro there has been practically a mortgage held on his vote by the Republican party and whenever any disposition has been manifested to break away and act with independence the Republican managers have felt like fore-

closing the mortgage and putting the Negro back in his disfranchised condition. Unless they vote solidly for the party which has always promised and never fulfilled, they are denounced as allies of the Democracy and ingrates to their political benefactors.
They have been taught that the only political creed they should know is opposition to the white people among whom they live and upon whom they depend for their best employment. They have been sold of outrages committed upon them that they know nothing about. They have been warned against purposes that have no existence. They have, as a word, been dragged at the wheels of the Republican chariot until they have become a spectacle for the amusement of the world. When they parted with the old system of slavery and became free to exercise their judgment and act with equal liberty, under the law, with the whites, they voluntarily accepted a political slavery—a party dictatorship, more absolute and unquestioning than any that the world has ever seen. Nevertheless the schemes of those who have craved the whip of the colored master over them have failed, and the value of the Negro vote in the South, as a political chattel, is far below par.

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DEATH OF A GOOD MAN.

The death of Mr. William J. Yates, editor of the Charlotte Democrat, which occurred last Thursday, has carried sadness to many friends of the deceased throughout North Carolina.

Mr. Yates was one of the leading journalists in the State, having edited the Charlotte Democrat for more than 30 years. His death occurred at 3 o'clock in the morning and was the result of a stroke of apoplexy. He was born in Fayetteville in 1827, and was 61 years old at his death. The News & Observer says of him:
His leading characteristics were industry, sound judgment and good sense, and these qualities, joined to a sincere but altogether unassuming love of North Carolina and of his fellow men, made him a citizen of the highest value. He avoided public preferment but nevertheless rendered valuable public service, wielding great influence for good always in his county and in the State at large. He served faithfully as a member of the Council of State during a part of Gov. Ellis' administration in '59 and '60, and was a useful member of the board of trustees of the State University at Chapel Hill. He was also chairman of the board of directors of the Western Insane Asylum, and in this position did conspicuous good.
