WAKE FOREST COLLEGE.

Last week was a memorable season at this popular institution of learning. It was the annual commencement. Monday night was given up to the graduating class which consisted of twenty-eight young gentlemen. The exercises consisted of an oration by F. L. Merritt, of Morrisville; a history of the class by C. T. Bailey, Jr., of Raleigh ; a perphesy of the class by T. M. Hufham, of Scotland Neck closing address by the President of the class, W. C. Dowd, of Charlotte. This was a departure from the order hitherto followed on such occasions but seemed to be greatly enjoyed by the large audience in attendance; perhaps enjoyed all the more because it was something new

The Treasurer's report showed that there is an in terest-bearing endowment fund of a little over \$173,000, the largest en dowment belonging to any college in the State. 
