Briefs.

Charlotte is said to manufacture more paper for the country than perhaps any other place of equal size.

The Warrenton Gazette has entered upon its eighteenth year under the same management. Few papers in the State have done as well.

Messrs. Josephus Daniels and W. E. Christian were elected delegates at the Press Convention in Lenoir last week to attend the National Press Convention at Detroit in August.

The saloon keepers, of Cincinnati, not belonging to the saloon keepers' Association entered into resolutions to keep open their saloons last Sunday in defiance of the city authorities. From accounts ahead they found it lively.

Dr. A. E. Jones, of Cincinnati, was recently murdered at the age of 75 years. He was a member of the Governor's staff and perhaps better known than any other man in Cincinnati. He was murdered for his money.

An Editor shot and killed.

On Monday of last week, Col. R. J. Page, editor of the Times-Register at Marion, N. C., was shot and suddenly killed. He had left Marion at 3 o'clock p. m. for Round Knob and returned at 12 m. in company with Judge J. G. Hazelwood who recently visited Scotland Neck.

At the Coroner's inquest Judge Hazelwood gave the following testimony:

"I came in town near midnight with Col. Page. We started to Delinger's, on the way the cars passed us, it was dark. About fifty feet from the railroad crossing I heard an explosion, I saw some one falling—it was Col. Page. Some one ran off. Col. Page was lying dead on the ground. I did not see who did the shooting, I saw some man cross the light, I do not see well, I could not distinguish his shape or features. I did not hear Col. Page express any fear of being attacked. He said he was going to leave here soon. I did not see any one in front of us, I am confident the shot came from the rear, the shot seemed to come from six or eight feet in the rear. There were four to six shots."

It appears that Page had become too intimate with another man's wife.



\$100.00 REWARD.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Whereas, official information has been received at this department that Stonewall Jackson lies of the county of Halifax stands charged with murder of Warren Tillery.

And whereas, it appears that the said Stonewall Jackson has fled the State, so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him.

Now, therefore, I, DANIEL G. FOWLER, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this my proclamation, offering a reward of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS for the apprehension and delivery of the said Stonewall Jackson to the Sheriff of Halifax county, at the Court House in Halifax, and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.

Done at our city of Raleigh, the 22nd day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, and in the one hundred and fourteenth year of our American Independence.
