Direct Tax.

HALIFAX PEOPLE WHO PAID IT AND TO WHOM IT WILL BE REFUNDED. Clerk Gregory has received the list of the direct taxes from the Governor and is ready to fill out applications for the same. These taxes are refunded only to the landowner, the executor or administrator. Where the applicant holds the original receipt it should be attached to the application; if the original receipt cannot be found two witnesses must certify to the ownership. Certificate must in all cases be made before the clerk. These taxes were collected in 1876 under a law passed in 1873.

Following are the names of the owners of the land, and of those who paid the taxes in cases where the owner did not pay them. The names are given alphabetically according to the districts in the county, which numbered 16.
