



SAN JOSE JOE.

A Monster Tiger Shark That Was Known to All Skippers of the Pacific Coast. There is on exhibition in a Stewart treet saloon in the shape of a photograph "all that is mortal" of "San Jose oe. 'San Jose Joe was in his lifetime a shark, and was better known along the coast from Gustemala to Panama than any skipper sailing the Pacific,




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
