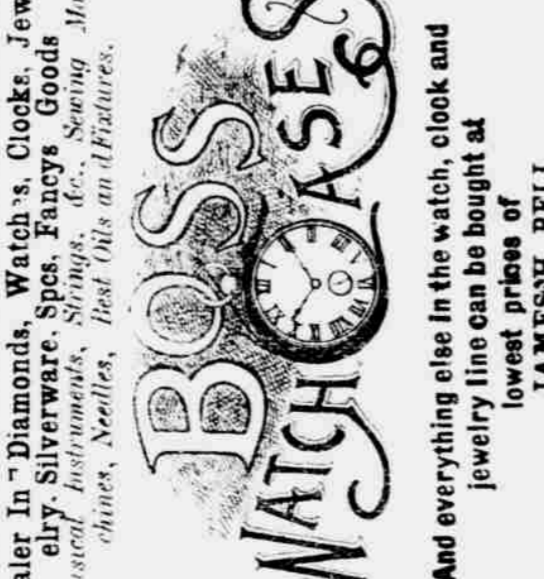
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Table with columns for Stations, Daily, and Sunday. Includes routes like Norfolk Ar., Rocky Mt., and various branch lines.
