ENTERED AT THE POST-OFFICE | few days ago they were notified that wages would be reduced, and when they showed dissatisfaction at they were soon impressed with the probability that they would lose their places and other laborers would be employed instead. They did not like that prospect any bet ter than the prospect of reduced

wages; and so they made resistance Their resistance was not justi fiable in all its aspects, but their aves and the lives of their wives and little ones depended upon the matter. They must have employ ment and any organized effort or the part of capital to cut short their wages meant a great deal to them.

This great "protected" industry. instead of having a friendly and amicable adjustment of the situation, demanded a surrender of the works of which the laborers had aken possession.

There was some mismanage. ment on the part of the county authorities and the company sent for three hundred hired "Pinkerton detectives" to come down to Home stead and force the hard-handed laborers to submit to the dictations of the money power for which they had been accustomed to labor.

The Pinkerton men were armed with Winchester rifles and were prepared to do bloody work and did it, although they disclaimed any knowledge of where they were going and for what purpose. This is told in a Pinkerton's story printed elsewhere in this issue.

The laborers being determined to de before they would submit to force, met the Pinkerton men and would not let them land from their barges. Fall five thousand persons, some armed and some not, met the Pinker ons and forced them after bloody battle to raise a flag of truce; not, however, before fifteen or twenty of the Homestead men were killed and some of the Pinkertons also.

When the Pinkertons raised a flag of truce the Homestead men ceased firing. But they broke their faith and went upon the barges and took the Pinkerton men. 

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
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
