PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE. THE SITUATION DISCUSSED.

Prompt Action Ursed.

By telegraph to the Disputch. Washington, D. C., August 8.-The following is the message of the President

Washington, D. C., August 8, 1893 To the Condress of the United States "The existence of an alarm ig and extraordinary business situation, involving the welfare and prosperity of of all our people, has constrained me to call together in extra session the people's representatives in Congress, to the end that through a wise and patriotic exercise of the legislative duty with which they solely are charged present evils may be mitigated and

dangers threatening the future may be

mitigated and dangers threatening the

future may be averted.

"Our unfortunate financial plight is not the result of untoward events nor of conditions related to our natural resources, nor is it traceable to any of the afflictions which frequently check national growth and prosperity. With plenteous crops, with abundant promise of remunerative production and manuinvestment, and with satisfactory as surance to business enterprise, suddenly financial distrust, far and near, sprung up on every side. Numerous moneyed institutions have suspended because abundant assets were not immediately available to meet the demands of frightened depositors. Surviving corporations and individuals are content to keep in hand the money they are usually anxious to loan, and those engaged in legitimate business are surprised to find that the securities they offer for loans, though heretofore satisfactory, are no longer accepted. "Undoubtedly the monthly purchases by the government of 1,500,000 ounces of silver, enforced under that statue, were regarded by those interested in silver production as a certain guaranty of its increase in price. THE GOLD RESERVE.

The policy necessarily adopted or paying these notes in gold has not spared the gold reserve of \$100,000,000 long ago set aside by the government for the redemption of other notes, for this fund has already been subject to the payment of new obligations amounting to about \$150,000,000 on account of silver purchases, and has, as facture, with unusual invitation to safe a consequence, for the first time since its creation, been encroached upon.

DEPLETION OF OUR GOLD STOCK. "We have thus made the depletion of our gold easy, and have tempted other and more appreciative nations to add it to their stock. That the opportunity we have offered has not been neglected is shown by the large amounts of gold which have been recently drawn from our Treasury and exported to increase the financial strength of foreign nations. Their government has no right to injure them by financial experiments opposed to the policy and practice of other civilized States, nor is it justified in permitting an exaggerated and unreasonable reliance on our national strength and ability to jeopardize the soundness of the people's

"This matter rises above the plane of party polities. It vitally concerns every business and calling and enters every household in the land.
