In the last issue we reterred to some of the acts of the Fusion Legislature. To most of the people of the State i would seem unnecessary to refer now to the actual work of the Legislature. as it has been but a few weeks since they adjourned.

But while the Legislature was in ses sion it was impossible to study calmly and carefully their work as we can now And as they were pledged to reform, we think it profitable to continue the study of that feature of their work. By doing so we can see the inconsistencies of the work with the promises they made the people.

In our last we showed that in the matter of appointing new magistrates that were not needed or wanted, except for partisan purposes, the State was subjected to an unnecessary expense of N. C. over \$26,000.

Besides the unpardonable inconsistency of the Legislature in running the State to such expense for equipment of new magistrates, there was much more extravagance that showed great discrepancy between their promises and pledges to the people and their actual work umas of The Democrat of that town. general appropriations. It was given by 548.41; for the Deaf and Dumb \$21,-500; for educational institutions \$25,-000. This makes an increase of \$76, 028.41. Add the \$26,932.50 for equipment of new magistrates and \$3,262.37 for contested election cases, and you have the round sum of \$106,223.28.
