Governor's Proclamation.

\$150.00 REWARD.

STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Whereas, official information has been received at this Department that Robert Whitaker late of the county of Halifax stands charged with the murder of J. N. Harrell. And whereas, it appears that the said Robert Whitaker has fled the State, or so conceals himself that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon him:

Now, therefore, I, Elias Carr, Governor of the State of North Carolina, by virtue of authority in me vested by law, do issue this My Proclamation, offering a reward of One Hundred and Fifty Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the said Robert Whitaker to the Sheriff of Halifax County at the Court House in Halifax, and I do enjoin all officers of the State and all good citizens to assist in bringing said criminal to justice.

Done at our city of Raleigh, in the 13th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six and in the one hundred and twentieth year of our American Independence.

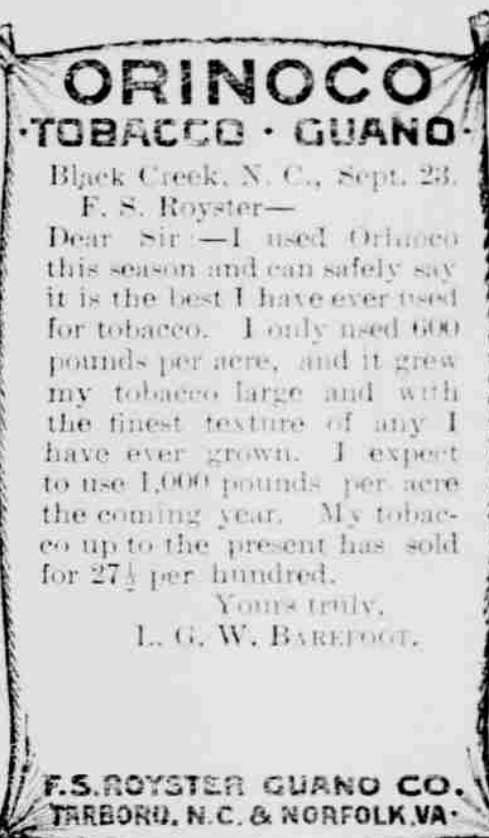
