

In the South the sale of intoxicating liquors has been prohibited in a great many counties while nearly all the cities have

within which licenses are granted. But the decrease in the number of saloons is not restricted to the South; it extends to all sections.

Under the Rames law the number of licenses is so limited that the number of saloons in New York has been greatly reduced. Similar results are seen however, in States and cities where there is no law limiting the proportion of the saloons to the population. One hundred of the 900 liquor dealers in Louisville have failed to renew the licenses this year. Chicago has 1,000 diers. It has a splendid harbor which lewer soloons this year than last.

Some of the crew and soldiers accepted the occurrence as a miracle from God, but Nunez himself is silent on this head, being a bettter observer of natural history than a theologian.


