



It has been many years since the crops were so nearly all gathered from the fields thus early in the autumn. Cotton opened quite early and it has been a most favorable season for har vesting. And despite the fact that we have just passed through a most excithave managed in some way to gather in their crops.

This gives a most favorable opportunity to prepare for the next crop. Let all who have not done so gather their crops as quickly as possible and turn attention to the preparation for the next.

It might as well be settled for good that the most that is to be made in this part of the State for quite a number of years to come must be made from the products of the land. East ern Carolina is naturally an agricultural section. This is so by reason of the great fertility of the lands here as well as other influences. No great manufacturing industries have yet sprung up in this immediate region through which large amounts of money have been turned loose amongst the people and if such should be the case even in the near future, the farmer who is larthest ahead with his own business wil be ahead also in the advantages that may come through the multiplication of business enterprises.

The wise thing for our farmers to do, is to commence at once to prepare for the crop of 1897. This applies to all tarmers alike. Whether a man works a large force of hands or whether he plows one horse and cultivates his crops people, and in broadened sympathies, with the labor of his own sons, if he is wise in his plans he will have done much of the work for 1897 before the Christmas holidays of 1896.
