Her husband went over to Wilson with his little son, Bruce, Tuesday, the day before the operation, and found Mrs. Taylor in fairly good spirits. Her physicians were hopeful of a successful operation and so was she, but she seemed to have some borodings of death and gave instructions about certain things in case she should die.

Thursday Mrs. W. A. Dunn was telegraphed for and went to the bedside of her dying cousin. Her husband and two of her children, Ned and Bruce, and Mrs. Dunn were with her in her last hours.

The body was brought home Friday morning at 9 o'clock and remained in the parlor until 5:30 in the afternoon. Dr. Hufham of Henderson, who baptized her into the Baptist church here some years ago, was telegraphed for to conduct the burial service.

A 5:30 o'clock long procession moved slowly from the residence to the Episcopal cemetery, where the body was laid to rest near the grave of her father, the late D. Edmondson.

Dr. Hufham read the Scriptures, Rev. O. Ryder, pastor of the Methodist church here, offered prayer; and while the grave was being filled friends sang "How Firm a Foundation," and as the sun was setting the new-made mound was literally covered with sweet and beautiful flowers as a token of the warm affection in which the deceased was held by all.

Mrs. Minnie Taylor was born June 24th, 1867, was the second daughter of D. Edmondson and Mary Edmondson, the mother still surviving. On April 12th, 1887, she was married to Mr. O. K. Taylor. For awhile they resided in Whitakers, Mr. Taylor's old home, but later came to live in Scotland Neck. The marriage was blessed with five children, all living, the youngest being two years old.
