STATE NEWS.

Happenings Noted During the Week.

CULLED FROM OUR EXCHANGES.

FOUL MURDER NEAR WILLIAMSTON.

The Williamston Enterprise tells of a foul murder near that place on Oct. 20th, which was brought to light last week. A white man named John Watts murdered a colored man named Dempsey Bond. The latter was from Bertie county, and Watts finding him trunked him of money, induced him to go to the house of a man named Page, who was away from home. Watts and Bond went into Page's house to stay all night, and according to Watts, confession he killed Bond and buried him near by. The body was found where Page said Watts told him it was. Watts and Page are both in jail.

KINSTON LOAN ASSOCIATION.

Kinston Free Press: At the meeting of the directors of the Kinston Building and Loan association, at Dr. Faulkner's office Tuesday night (which meeting was attended by ten of the twelve directors), it was decided to begin the issuing of the first series of stock on Friday, Nov. 15th. This stock is in shares of \$100 and payments are to be made at the rate of 25 cents per share a week until it matures. From the experience of other home building and loan associations, it is expected the stock will mature in about six years. There is much interest felt in the association and the prospect is that fully \$50,000 will be sold of the first series of stock.

A SHOCKING ACCIDENT.

Wilson Times: Last Wednesday morning a shocking accident occurred at the jail in this city. The convicts were all lined up ready to go out to work when one of them, who had been sick, asked for some medicine. Mr. Warren, one of the guards, was standing in his usual place—on the little stand at the head of the stairway, which runs up to Superintendent Massey's room. This places him so as to see all of the prisoners at once and in case any should run, gives him a clear field for a shot.

When asked for the medicine, Mr. Massey went up these stairs to get it and he passed Mr. Warren, who had the stock of his double-barrelled breach loader resting on the floor, as he passed Warren, the latter lifted his gun out of the way and as he did it slipped and fell among the prisoners. It fell in such a way as to become discharged and the whole load of buck shot entered the body of Scott Parker, one of the prisoners from Black Creek township. Parker was at once taken to the sanatorium where he received the best attention, but on Wednesday at 11 o'clock he died.

PREACHER AGAINST CIRCUSES.

Fremont Visitor: The pastor of a colored church in a neighboring town announced before the coming of the circus that any of his members who attended the circus would be disciplined. A young woman, Secretary of the Sunday-school, went to the show. Last week an official meeting was held and the offender's name was stricken from the registry of the church. Last Sunday when Sunday-school opened the old Secretary with her books was in place ready to perform her usual duty. One of the members, desiring to prevent a scene, intimated to the girl's father that under the circumstances, his daughter could not serve as Secretary. The father replied that she was there to serve and she would. The result was no Sunday-school that day, and the meeting adjourned with the questioned still unsettled.

PRODUCTS FROM WYOMING.

Statesville Landmark: Dr. E. A. Hall, of Bethany, has left with The Landmark a sample of oats and Irish potatoes grown on the farm of Mr. S. W. Gillespie, at Lookout, Wyoming. The potatoes are quite large and resemble our home grown potatoes except that the skin is much brighter. They evidently grow fine potatoes in Wyoming. Dr. Hall says they clear away the sage-brush, plow a furrow, put in potatoes, turn the ground up into ridges, and no other work is done to the crop except to irrigate it.

The sample of oats is of an unknown variety. Dr. Hall says the oats were raised on a tract of land, embracing about 2,500 acres, which was formerly a lake and entirely covered with water. In recent years the water has disappeared entirely, drawn away probably by irrigation. The bed of this immense lake is covered with rich sediment, is now under cultivation and grows very fine oats. The rich, loose soil is harrowed and the oats put in and left until harvest.
